- CAMPBELL, Ian. Reader in English at the University of Edinburgh; has recently published Lewis Grassic Gibbon in the Scottish Writers Series. With this volume Campbell joins the Editorial Board of Studies in Scottish Literature.
- COLE, Richard. Professor of English at Davidson College where he has taught since 1961. Has edited the Yale editions of the Private Papers of James Boswell and published several articles on Boswell, Smollett, Goldsmith and eighteenth-century Irish publishing.
- CRIBB, T.J. Fellow and Director of Studies in English, Churchill College, Cambridge. Previously at Universities of Glasgow, Oxford, and Minnesota. Visiting Senior Lecturer at University of Ife, Nigeria, 1977-78. Current research interests mainly in Shakespeare studies.
- CRISCUOLA, Margaret M. An Editor with Great Books Foundation, Chicago. Has taught at Washington University, St. Louis, and the University of Wisconsin-Stout, and written

- KRATZMANN, Gregory. Senior Lecturer in English, La Trobe University, Melbourne. PhD from Edinburgh University. Author of Anglo-Scottish Literary Relations, 1430-1550 and editor of "Colkelbie Sow" and "The Talis of the Fyve Bestes."
- Mcclery, Alistair. PhD St. Andrews; teaches at Napier College, Edinburgh. Main interest in British literature of the interwar period. Has published on Neil Gunn and other Scottish writers of the 20's and 30's in *The Scottish Review*, The Bibliotheck and Scottish Literary Journal.
- MENDELSON, Michael. Has returned to academic life and is Assistant Professor at Iowa State University; has published articles on nineteenth-century British romance.
- SHEARER, Tom G. BA Stirling University; MA Edinburgh University. Main literary interests are Scottish and African literatures and the modern novel.

TIMKO, Michael. Professor of English at the City University of New York since 1961 and currently the Executive Officer of the Ph.D. Program in English.
