Letter, 22 May 1816, written by John Hiddleson (1796–1854) from Georgetown to Augustus Cook (1766–1866) in Middletown, Connecticut describes his trip to South Carolina from Connecticut and his taking possession of several enslaved individuals apparently through inheritance. After a nineteen-day trip to Georgetown via New York and Charleston, the young Hiddleson arrived at the house of his "Aunt Smith," where he learned the details of his inheritance. He informed Cook that "one of them is a carpenter...one is a Taylor...one by the name of George learning the Shewmakers trade, and one more learning the Carpenters trade and 5 I have on the Plantation." Although Hiddleson apparently owed money to Cook, he informed that he had been advised that the "best thing...to do" rather than sell these individuals would instead to be to "buy a Plantation about 90 Miles from Georgetown." He closed by assuring Cook that he would return to Middletown in June or July the following year "upon some surtein business."

A native of Connecticut, Hiddleson apparently remained in Georgetown and operated a mercantile establishment. He died at the age of fifty-four years and is buried in Wallingford, Connecticut. Acquired for the Library by the University South Caroliniana Society.
