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Oil portrait, circa 1825, of Henry Clay of Kentucky, is attributed to the school of Matthew Harris Jouett (1788–1827). The full-length portrait shows Clay standing with one hand on a draped table and the other on his hip. Behind him is an opening with the curtain pulled back to reveal a column to the left and a building with three domes in the far distance, possibly the United States Capitol. The face bears a strong resemblance to the portrait of Clay by Jouett, but the whole is not representative of Jouett's work. John C. Calhoun served with Clay, and together with Daniel Webster, they became the "Great Triumvirate" in Congress. **Gift of the Estate of Mr. William S. Broadbent.**
