THE LAW SCHOOL

The course this summer in Federal Tax Practice, taught by Howe P. Cochran, Esq., of the Washington and New York Bars, proved of especial benefit to students, including seniors of the September and January graduating classes. This training in income, gift, and estate phases of federal taxation was also attended by a number of attorneys of the Orangeburg, Sumter, and Columbia bars. The usual comment heard was that the lectures, of two and one-half hours each, seem like only fifteen minutes, due to Mr. Cochran's ability to instruct in a clear and easily-remembered style, but also to sustain student interest throughout. There were practically no absences. The hope has been expressed that Mr. Cochran can be induced to return for other lectures in the future.

The third meeting of the Law Teachers Conference of the South-eastern Region of the Association of American Law Schools met at Gatlinburg, Tenn., on September 8, 9, and 10. This was attended by Professor Stubbs, Professor and Mrs. Sumner, Professor and Mrs. Means, Professor and Mrs. Roberts, and Dean and Mrs. Prince. On the program were such outstanding men as President Edwin D. Dickinson of the Association of American Law Schools, Professor W. Barton Leach of the Harvard Law Faculty, and others.

Two new full-time faculty members have been announced, David H. Means, Esq., and George Savage King, Esq. Mr Means is a graduate of the University Law School and has had eight years in practice. His high scholastic standing and flair for teaching fit him well for this position on the faculty. He expects to obtain a leave of absence next year for post-graduate work.

Mr. King is a graduate of the University Law School, and has done a substantial amount of teaching in the School of Business Administration of the University. He also taught labor law in the Law School this summer. Mr. King has had five years of practical experience in personnel problems with the Firestone and Fairchild Aircraft corporations. He goes to New York University this fall for a special post-graduate course in labor law.

This brings the full-time membership of the faculty to eight, not counting the Dean.

New additions to the staff include Miss Martha Glenn as Assistant Secretary, and Miss Jean Sims as Assistant Librarian. Miss Sims spent this summer at Columbia University studying Law Library Cataloging under Dean Miles O. Price of the Columbia faculty.

Plans are proceeding to move the physical equipment and operations of the Law School into the new law building. This is hoped to be completed sometime during the fall.

During the summer the Calhoun Inn of Phi Delta Phi, National Legal fraternity, was re-activated. It is hoped that the activities of this organization will prove beneficial to the University and the Law School.
