The fall 1967 Staff and Editorial Board are pleased to present this issue of the South Carolina Law Review. It should be noted at the outset, however, that the materials herein were prepared largely under the direction of the Staff for spring 1967. But it is equally important to note the efforts of the current staff culminating in this issue, with particular credit going to the Leading Articles Editor. During the summer months Miss Jean Hoefer worked tirelessly converting the papers and discussions from the Institute on Modern Trends in Handling the Chronic Alcoholic Offender into the printed form appearing here, barely squeezing in the time to become Mrs. William T. Toal. The Institute, itself, is the first in a series of annual events which, it is hoped, will be of benefit not only to the participants, but to Law Review readers as well.

Other events during the summer include the moving of the Law Review to new and more spacious quarters in the basement of the Law School. Members of the Bar are cordially invited to visit and inspect the new facilities.

The other big news from the summer is that the South Carolina Law Review will host the Annual Conference of the Southern Conference of Law Reviews, an organization with a membership of some thirty publications representing law schools throughout the South.
