Present Wording

CURRICULUM

South Carolina College offers three possible routes to earning Honors, with varying participation in the courses offered by the College. Track I, which comprises the minimal participation which a student could select within the College, is specifically designed for those majoring in pre-professional work, such as engineering, business administration, education, applied music, journalism, nursing or pharmacy. Successful completion of Track I, along with the appropriate college or departmental requirements, would lead to a B.A. or B.S. degree, granted by the appropriate college or school, with Honors from South Carolina College. Students in Track I are required to take one year each of SCC English and Science, and two SCC courses treating the history of civilization. In addition, they are required to take at least two further SCC courses in the humanities and social sciences, and one further SCC course in mathematics, logic, or science; their SCC courses must total at least 44 credit hours. Track II is required of those students majoring in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences or the College of Science and Mathematics and is available to all other South Carolina College students. Successful completion of Track II requirements, along with the appropriate college or departmental requirements, will lead to a B.A. or B.S. degree granted by the appropriate college with Honors from South Carolina College. Added to the basic core described for Track I is demonstration of proficiency in a foreign language by completion of a language course numbered 202 or higher, completion of a senior Honors Project (SCC 499: 3-9 credit hours), and additional SCC courses to total at least 59 credit hours.

All students must decide on which track they wish to pursue no later than the beginning of the junior year.

Successful completion of Track II requirements, along with the appropriate college or departmental requirements, will lead to a B.A. or B.S. degree granted by the appropriate college with Honors from South Carolina College. Added to the basic core described for Track I is demonstration of proficiency in a foreign language by completion of a language course numbered 202 or higher and additional SCC courses to total at least 59 credit hours.

All students must decide on which track they wish to pursue no later than the beginning of the junior year.
