REPORT: COMMITTEE ON CURRICULA AND COURSES

(For consideration by the Faculty Senate at its meeting on November 1, 1978)

[The Committee requests that any department which has a proposal being recommended by the Committee on Curricula and Courses provide a spokesman to attend the Faculty Senate meeting in which said proposal is to be recommended.]

The Committee recommends approval of the following changes in courses:

I. COLLEGE OF EDUCATION - *Approved*

Change in prerequisites, description and from pass-fail credit to regular earned grades

FROM: EDEC 469 DIRECTED TEACHING IN EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION. (6)
(Prereq: students must meet requirements of freshman, sophomore, and junior year as outlined in early childhood program of study). Students will work with children (Nursery through fourth grade) in an educational setting with supervision in all areas of the curriculum.

TO: EDEC 469 DIRECTED TEACHING IN EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION. (6)
(Prereq: requirements as specified in the Admission to Student Teaching Section of Bulletin) Students will work with young children in an educational setting, with direct supervision, in all areas of the curriculum. No pass-fail option.

FROM: EDEC 111, 210, 211, 310, 311, 410 PRACTICUM IN EDUCATION. (1 each) A sequence of supervised practicum experiences in various types of educational settings. Seminars and group discussion included. Pass-fail credit.

TO: EDEC 111, 210, 211, 310, 311, 410 PRACTICUM IN EDUCATION. (1 each) A sequence of supervised practicum experiences in various types of educational settings. Seminars and group discussion included. No pass-fail option.

MUSC 547 ORGAN LITERATURE. (3)

New courses

MUSC 373 JAZZ AND AMERICAN POPULAR MUSIC. (3) Development of jazz and American popular music through the study of important soloists, ensembles, arrangers and composers.

MUSC 577 GUITAR PEDAGOGY. (3) (Prereq: MUSC 242P or consent of instructor) Principles of playing and teaching the classic guitar.

MUSC 585, 586 ORGAN LITERATURE I, II. (3 each) Organ literature and registration from antiquity to 1750 (first semester) and from 1750 to the present (second semester).

MUSC 587 REPERTORIES OF THE LUTE, VIHUELA AND GUITAR. (3) (Prereq: MUSC 242P or consent of instructor) Solo literature for plucked, fretted instruments from the Renaissance into the 20th Century. National styles, traits and technical innovations included.

SOCY 401 SOCIOLOGY OF EDUCATION. [=EDFN 401] (3) Analysis of educational institutions, organizations, processes, and their effects in contemporary society.
