- FREN 316 BUSINESS FRENCH. (3) ^(Prereq: FREN 310, 311 or consent of instructor) Commercial organizations and businesses in France. Practical business correspondence. Terminology and techniques in commercial transactions with the Certificat Pratique of the Paris Chamber of Commerce in view. Taught in French.

II. COLLEGE OF SCIENCE AND MATHEMATICS.

A. Department of Biology

Change in hours and description

- FROM: BIOL 232 ANATOMY. (4) Required of students in the Colleges of Nursing and Pharmacy. Three lecture and three laboratory hours per week.
- TO: BIOL 232 ANATOMY. (3) Functional anatomy of the human body and its relevance to disease processes. Not for biology major credit. ~~Three lecture and three laboratory hours per week.~~

New course

- BIOL 232L (1) ANATOMY LABORATORY. (1) (Coreq: BIOL 232) The principles of anatomy as demonstrated by microscopic studies and animal dissection. Three hours per week.

COLLEGE OF HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES

Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures

- FREN 111X INTENSIVE INTRODUCTORY FRENCH. (7) (Prereq: consent of instructor) Beginning language practice emphasizing oral communication. Team taught. Credit not awarded for ^{both} French 111X and 101-102.
- GERM 211X INTENSIVE INTERMEDIATE GERMAN. (6) (Prereq: GERM 111X OR 101/102 and/or consent of instructor) Fundamentals of language emphasizing oral communication. Team-taught. Credit not awarded for ^{both} German 211X and German 201-202.
- THSP 563X THEATRICAL PRODUCTION CRAFTS. (3) Series of lectures and workshops examining the design, fabrication and handling of stage properties, theatrical masks and theatrical furniture. Students will design and execute several relevant projects.

IV. Policy on Course Restrictions. - Approved

The computer registration procedure is able to enforce certain types of enrollment restrictions such as college, major, and upper/lower division status. The Committee on Curricula and Courses views the implementation of these restrictions as changes in the course description, and has not approved any course restrictions at this point. We would, in general, prefer that enrollment be restricted by logical prerequisites.

The Committee has adopted the following procedures:

1. Course changes which include restrictions must also include "special permission", and identify the source, i.e., instructor, department, program or college/school should be identified.
2. The Committee will send copies of these courses to the Dean (or his/her designate) of units with allied interests.
3. If the Dean feels that some of the students in his/her unit are likely to enroll in the course, then he/she will consult with the Dean of the offering unit, to determine alternative prerequisites which will serve to prepare the student for the course.
4. Students who meet these prerequisites, are in good standing, and who will benefit from these courses will be recommended by their Dean. The final approval would be pro forma.
5. The office of the Provost would adjudicate differences between the Deans.

V. Request for Communication of Bulletin Errors.

During the past several years, changes in the Bulletin have been made (renumbered courses, changed hours, separated laboratories from lectures, etc.) which affect other units. In addition, several major errors have been noted in the 1984-1985 Bulletin. Please check the Bulletin to be sure that courses mentioned are correct. The Committee will direct corrections (as opposed to changes) to the Bulletin Editor.
