REPORT: COMMITTEE ON CURRICULA AND COURSES

(For consideration by the Faculty Senate at its meeting on December 5, 1979)

[The Committee requests that any department which has a proposal being recommended by the Committee on Curricula and Courses provide a spokesman to attend the Faculty Senate meeting in which said proposal is to be recommended.]

The Committee recommends approval of the following changes in courses:

I. COLLEGE OF GENERAL STUDIES

- sent back to committee to include a screen language requirement

New Degree Program

On page 87U of the University Catalogue insert the following paragraph*:

The College of General Studies offers two-year programs leading to the degree of Associate in Science in the fields of child development, commercial education, criminal justice and institutional administration.

*The College of General Studies additionally offers a program leading to a Bachelor of Science degree in Hotel, Restaurant, and Tourism Administration.

The College also administers a unique four-year baccalaureate program which leads to the Bachelor of Arts in Interdisciplinary Studies degree. This degree program was conceived as an alternative to the restrictions of traditional baccalaureate curricula for students who seek a more general or interdisciplinary approach to their college work.

The remainder of page 88U and also page 89U stays the same.

On page 89U add the new degree: "Bachelor of Science in Hotel, Restaurant and Tourism Administration" above the Bachelor of Interdisciplinary Studies Degree Program".

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN HOTEL, RESTAURANT, AND TOURISM ADMINISTRATION

Degree Program

The HRTA program is unique at this University because a student can earn an Associate degree and a Bachelor's degree in four years (including a one summer internship). After completing the Lower Division he may apply for an Associate of Science in Institutional Administration degree and enter the work force, or he may choose to continue his education and seek a Bachelor of Science degree in HRTA as well.

Entrance Requirements

Admission requirements for the HRTA degree program are the same as for other baccalaureate programs at the University. See pp. 7-11 for application procedures. Transfer students will be admitted to the program subject to review of the director. Students already possessing the Associate of Science in Institutional Administration degree from this University may apply for direct entry into the Upper Division of HRTA.

Progression Requirements

The requirements for continuing scholastic eligibility are determined by the statement on academic standing covering suspension and probation as stated in the University catalog and bulletins.

To be considered for admission to the Upper Division, a student must have completed at least 66 semester hours as stipulated in Degree Requirements with a cumulative grade point ratio of at least 2.0 on all hours attempted and at least 2.5 on all courses from the professional area.
