On February 22, 1980 the Student Senate approved with some modifications the Student Affairs Committee's recommendation regulating participation as a leader of student organizations based upon cumulative GPR. The recommendation is:

"An undergraduate or Law and Medical School student member of a licensed student organization including all branches of student government who has been elected, selected or appointed an officer, as defined by their organizational constitution, must have a minimum of a cumulative 2.0 GPR before he/she is eligible to assume that role.

A graduate student member of a licensed student organization including all branches of student government who has been elected, selected or appointed an officer, as defined by their organizational constitution, must have a minimum of a cumulative 3.0 GPR before he/she is eligible to assume that role.

An officer of an organization who falls below the previously mentioned GPR while holding the position, will be given a probationary period of one semester to raise his/her cumulative GPR to 2.0 or 3.0 for undergraduate, law <sup>and medical</sup> students and graduate students respectively.

That each athletic captain of any intercollegiate team and head cheerleader for both men and women meet the same guidelines as set forth for any officer of any licensed student organization.
